NOAA published the draft management plan and draft environmental assessment, kicking off a public comment period.

Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary protects 1,470 square miles of ocean waters around the Northern Channel Islands:
Anacapa, Santa Cruz, Santa Rosa, San Miguel, and Santa Barbara islands. A special place for endangered species, sensitive habitats, historic shipwrecks, and cultural resources, the sanctuary provides protection through research, education, conservation, and stewardship.

PROPOSED ACTION PLANS

Action plans detail specific strategies and activities to address priority conservation and management issues and to implement core sanctuary programs over the coming decade.

The draft management plan is composed of 10 proposed action plans:

- Climate Change
- Marine Debris
- Vessel Traffic
- Introduced Species
- Zone Management
- Education and Outreach
- Research and Monitoring
- Resource Protection
- Cultural Resources and Maritime Heritage
- Operations and Administration

Sanctuary Regulations

- No changes to sanctuary regulations are proposed with the draft management plan.
- Staff have not identified the need for any changes to sanctuary regulations at this time, but modifications may be considered in the future.
